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UPSC CIVIL SERVICES EXAMINATION

The Civil Services exam is conducted by the UNION PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION every year. It has three stages.



PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION

This is strictly a screening test designed to filter a massive pool of candidates down to a select few for the next round.

MAINS EXAMINATION

The Mains stage evaluates the depth of your knowledge, structural clarity, analytical reasoning, and written expression.

PERSONALITY TEST

This stage evaluates your judgment, ethical balance, awareness, composure, and overall administrative potential.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION

General Studies Paper I (GS)

- Current events of national and international importance.
- History of India and Indian National Movement.
- Indian and World Geography – Physical, Social, Economic Geography of India and the World.
- Indian Polity and Governance – Constitution, Political System, Panchayati Raj, Public Policy, Rights Issues, etc.
- Economic and Social Development – Sustainable Development, Poverty, Inclusion, Demographics, Social Sector Initiatives, etc.
- General issues on Environmental ecology, Bio-diversity and Climate Change – that do not require subject specialization.
- General Science.

General Studies Paper II (CSAT)

- Comprehension;
- Interpersonal skills including communication skills;
- Logical reasoning and analytical ability;
- Decision making and problem solving;
- General mental ability;
- Basic numeracy (numbers and their relations, orders of magnitude, etc.) (Class X level), Data interpretation (charts, graphs, tables, data sufficiency etc. – Class X level)



Things to note for Prelims examination



- Questions relating to English Language Comprehension skills of Class X level (last item in the syllabus of CSAT-II) will be tested through passages in English Language only, without providing Hindi translation thereof in the question paper.
- The questions will be of Multiple Choice Objective Type.
- It is important to note that there is negative marking for each incorrect answer. A wrong answer will attract a penalty of 1/3rd of the marks allotted to that particular question
- CSAT Paper II has been made qualifying from 2015. A candidate has to score a minimum of 33% of the marks to qualify in this paper. The marks scored in this paper will not be added to the marks scored in GS Paper I to arrive at the cut-off to clear Prelims.
- A candidate must have attained the age of 21 years as of 1st August of the year in which he or she appears for the Preliminary Examination.

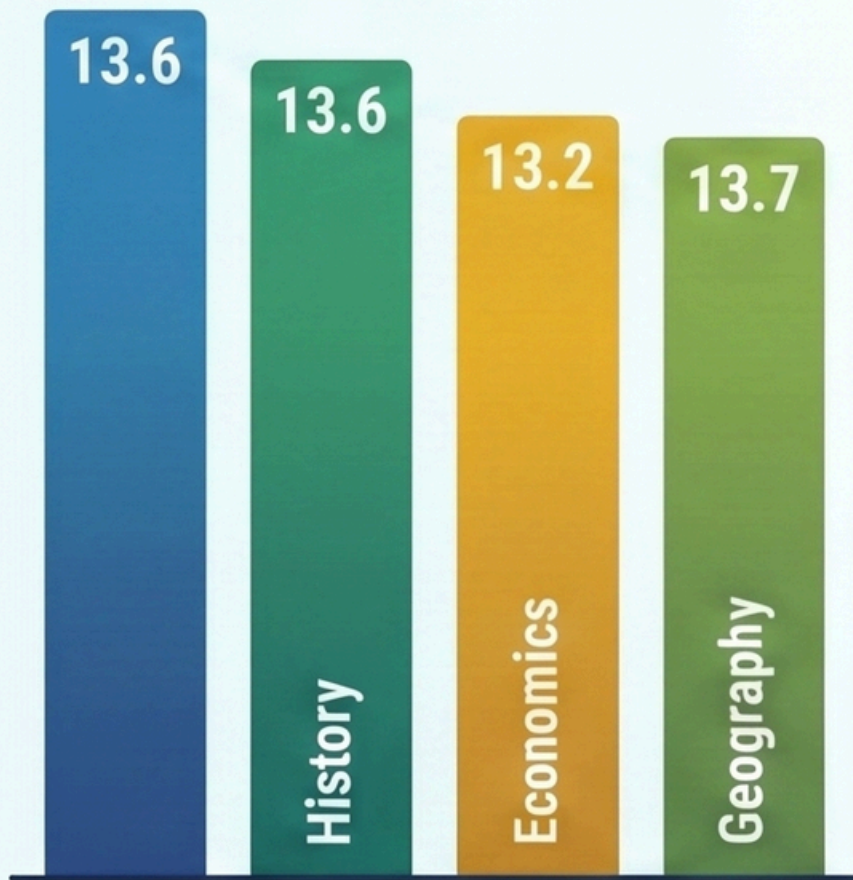

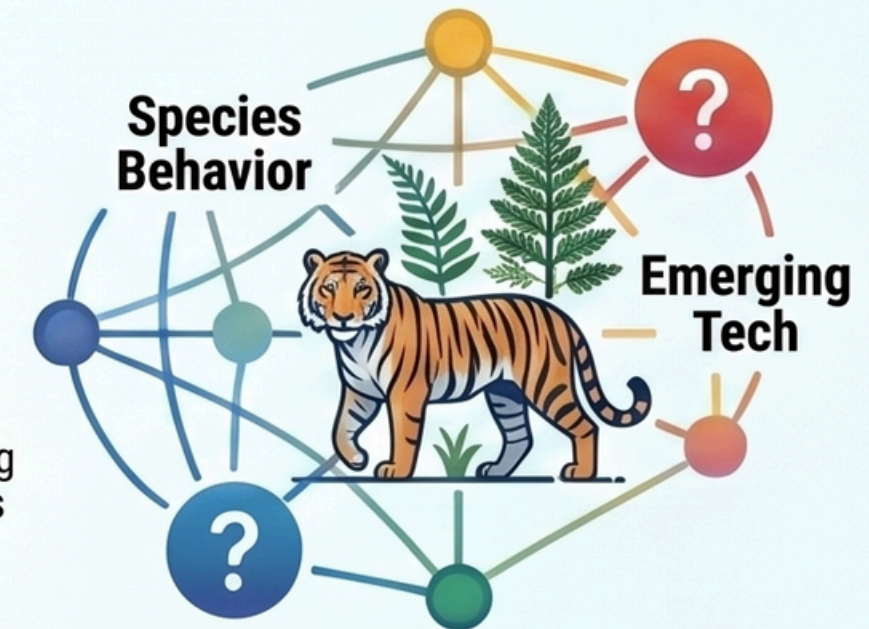

Paper A: Indian Language (300 Marks)

Choose one language from the Eighth Schedule; minimum 25% score required to qualify.



Paper B: English (300 Marks)

Compulsory paper testing proficiency, minimum 25% score required.



Stage 1: The Written Examination (9 Papers Total)

The Gateway to Civil Services. A descriptive/written examination evaluating intellectual depth and critical thinking.

Branch B: Merit-Based Papers (Marks Counted for Ranking)



7 Papers x 250 Marks Each

Core of the written merit score, totaling 1750 marks.



Paper I: Essay

Write on specific topics to demonstrate articulation and coordination of ideas.



Papers II to V: General Studies (GS I, II, III, & IV)

Covers Heritage, History, Geography, Governance, Constitution, Economy, Science, Technology, and Ethics.



Papers VI & VII: Optional Subject I & II

Two papers based on a single optional subject chosen from the UPSC prescribed list.

Oral assessment of personality and aptitude for candidates who clear the Mains written cut-off.



Written Merit Total: 1750 Marks

Sum of all seven merit-based papers.

$$1750 \text{ (Written Merit Total)} + 275 \text{ (Interview)} = 2025$$



Grand Total: 2025 Marks

The final score used for merit ranking and service allocation.

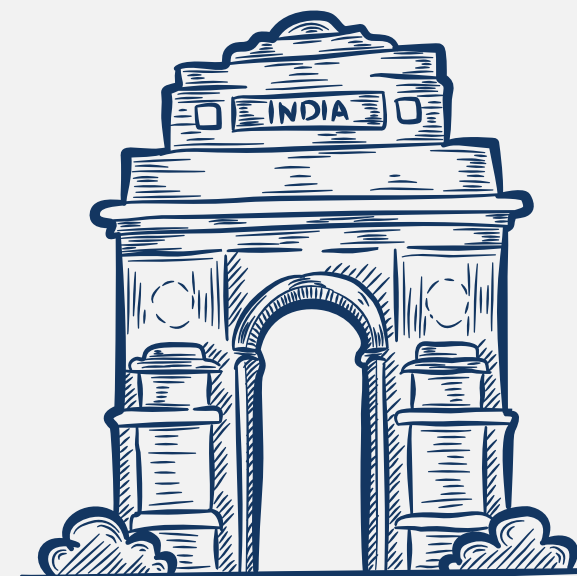

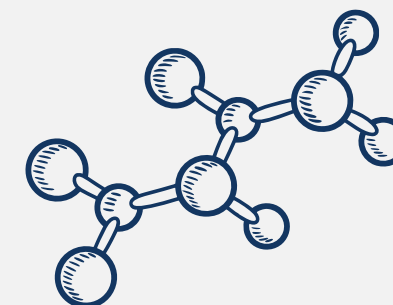

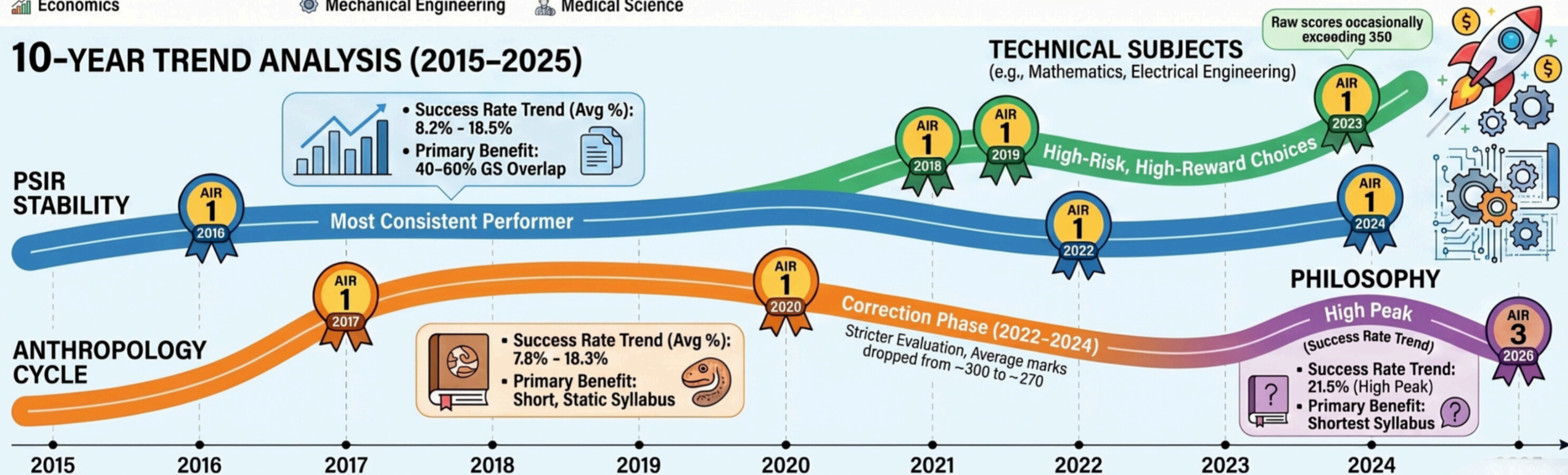

PERSONALITY TEST (INTERVIEW)

1. The candidate who has cleared the Mains examination will be interviewed by a board who will have before them a record of his/her career. He/she will be asked questions on matters of general interest.

2. The objective of the interview is to assess the personal suitability of the candidate for a career in public services by a board of competent and unbiased observers.

3. The test is intended to judge the mental caliber of a candidate. In broad terms, this is really an assessment of not only his/her intellectual qualities but also social traits and his/her interest in current affairs.

4. Some of the qualities to be judged are mental alertness, critical powers of assimilation, clear and logical exposition, the balance of judgment, variety, and depth of interest, the ability for social cohesion and leadership, and intellectual and moral integrity.

5. The technique of the interview is not that of a strict cross-examination but of a natural, well-directed, and purposive conversation which is intended to reveal the mental qualities of the candidate.

6. The interview test is not intended to be a test either of the specialized or general knowledge of the candidates which has already been tested through their written papers.

7. Candidates are expected to have taken an intelligent interest not only in their special subjects of academic study but also in the events which are happening around them both within and outside their own state or country as well as in modern currents of thought and in new discoveries which should arouse the curiosity of well-educated youth.

SUGGESTIONS FOR ASPIRANTS



Preparing for the UPSC Civil Services Examination (CSE) is a marathon, not a sprint. Here are a list of suggestions aspirants must follow:

1. Master the "Foundational Four"

Before diving into heavy reference books, students must build a solid conceptual base.

- NCERTs are Non-Negotiable: Complete NCERT books from Class 6 to 12 for History, Geography, and Sociology, and Class 9 to 12 for Polity and Economy.
- Syllabus Mapping: Memorize the syllabus. Students should be able to look at a news headline and instantly identify which GS Paper (I, II, III, or IV) it belongs to.
- The "Limited Sources" Rule: Follow the mantra: "Read one book ten times, not ten books one time." Stick to standard authorities like M. Laxmikanth for Polity and Spectrum for Modern History.

2. Dynamic Preparation Strategy

The UPSC exam is increasingly shifting toward "Current-Static" integration, where current events are linked to historical or legal foundations.

| AREA | STRATEGY |
|------------------------|--|
| Current Affairs | Read one standard newspaper daily (<i>The Hindu</i> or <i>Indian Express</i>). Focus on editorial analysis rather than political gossip. |
| CSAT (Paper II) | Don't ignore it. Many candidates fail GS Paper I because they under-prepare for the qualifying CSAT. Practice basic numeracy and logical reasoning weekly. |
| Answer Writing | Start early. Don't wait to "finish the syllabus" (you never will). Aim to write 2 answers daily to improve structure and speed. |



3. The 7-5-3 Rule for Mains

For the descriptive Main examination, students often struggle with time management. The 7-5-3 Rule is suggested here:

- 7 Minutes: The time you should spend per 10-mark question.
- 5 Points: The minimum number of high-quality points per answer, ideally supported by subheadings.
- 3 Dimensions: Try to look at every issue from three angles — Social, Economic, and Political.

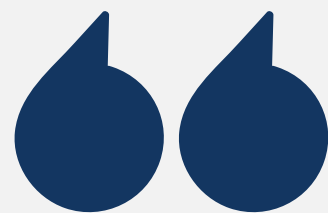
4. Psychological & Digital Discipline

UPSC is as much a test of mental endurance as it is of knowledge.

- The "Minimum Study" Safety Net: On days when motivation is low, students should have a "minimum target" (e.g., 2 hours of newspaper + 1 hour of revision) to maintain the habit.
- Active Revision Cycles: Implement a 1-7-30 rule. Revise what you learned after 1 day, then 7 days, then 30 days to move information into long-term memory.
- Mock Test Analysis: Taking a mock test is only 50% of the work. The other 50% is analyzing the mistakes to identify "knowledge gaps" versus "silly errors."

Pro-Tip for Students: The Personality Test (Interview) begins the day you start preparing. Develop a balanced opinion on national issues and cultivate a hobby —the board looks for a well-rounded individual, not a walking encyclopedia.
